Dear all

Mothering Sunday, which we celebrate tomorrow, is one of those awkward Sundays that bring up strong and conflicting emotions throughout congregations and society. For many, it is a powerful and timely reminder of the importance of motherhood, a celebration of the love offered us by our parents and the close bond that mother and child can have. For others, particularly those unable to have children or who had a chaotic and disruptive, or even violent, upbringing, it is a reminder of what could have been but isn't. For them, watching the rest of society celebrate is a smack in the face of their lack of what they most desired. It is right for us to celebrate the good and positive and loving, but we should never forget that as we celebrate, others mourn.

Of course, Mothering Sunday was not originally about celebrating the love of mothers, but about the Mother Church. The tradition of Mothering Sunday goes back to a time when many children worked away from home and did not have regular holidays or time off to come back home to visit the parental village. Mothering Sunday became the one weekend of the year when young people in service in the big houses were free to come and worship at their 'mother church', the church in which they grew up and near which their parents still lived.

Various legends have grown up around Mothering Sunday over the years. One is that the young people coming back from service would pick flowers along the country lanes to give to their mothers when they arrived home – thus the tradition of giving flowers to mothers on this day.

Another legend is that of the Simnel cake. A Simnel cake is a fruit cake with two layers of marzipan and 11 marzipan balls on top. Legend has it that the 11 balls represent the 11 disciples (not including Judas) and that it is called a Simnel cake because it was originally baked by a couple called Simon and Nell. One wanted the cake baked and the other wanted it boiled. In the end they did both and so linked their names into Simnel.

Like Simon and Nell, Mothering Sunday is a mix of joy and sadness, a celebration of what is and a yearning for what could have been or has been lost. As I've reflected on this past year, I've found that that mix of emotions is a vein that runs through so much of life. It is the warp and the weft, the

colours and the dark that make life what it is.

We can rail against the gloom of the night, or we can live with and through its darkness, knowing that brighter days will come. Whether today is a day of darkness or light, I pray God's presence with you in your joys and in your sadness.
