Readings for Trinity 3

Romans 6:12-23 and Matthew 10:40 - end

The verb ‘welcome’ appears no less than six times in today’s short Gospel reading.

I have happy memories of being made welcome, often by friends in their homes, our neighbours when we moved into a new home and also by a refugee family seeking asylum.

I wonder what your recollections are of being given welcome and hospitality.

Welcoming care is a wonderful aspect of God’s personality - take Psalm 23 for instance and the writer’s needs of rest and refreshment being met.

It’s worth reading the whole of chapter 10 to put verses 40 -42 in context and to see why Jesus spoke these words to his disciples.

We read of Jesus calling his twelve disciples together and giving them authority to go out and preach that God's kingdom is very near, not only in the words they say but in acts of healing and restoration.

Amazingly they are given instructions not to take money, food or extra clothing with them, instead their needs for shelter, rest and refreshment are to be provided by those living in the village or town they visit. He also warns them that their task is a challenging one in which they will encounter misunderstanding and trials.

The disciples are definitely going to need the welcome of rest and refreshment in their ministry; Jesus says that those who provide it will be rewarded with the same blessing that the messenger himself will receive.

Hebrews 13 verse 2 comes to my mind :-

‘Don't forget to show hospitality to strangers, for some who have done this have entertained angels unawares!’ (English Standard Version)

It's pleasing to God when the hospitality comes not from any reward to be gained but out of concern for the other human being whose path crosses with ours- a response out of gratitude for the care and welcome we have received through others from God.

What is more the welcome is not only welcoming the disciple –God's bringer of the Good News – but also Jesus himself.

Let's be encouraged us to support -in prayer and practical ways -those who have lay and ordained ministries locally and in the world wide church.

Encouraged also to 'go out' and share the good news of God's welcoming nature to those we share our lives with day by acts of kindness and care.
