Letter from Andy 5th September 2020

Coming back off holiday is difficult at the best of times, but doing it just as the nation is emerging from lock-down is a strange and unsettling experience. A local vicar says he feels like he's riding a unicycle up a cobbled hill – very uncertain and one step backwards to every two steps forward.

Without doubt this next few months are going to be the most discombobulating and difficult of the pandemic so far. Some people are getting back to something like normal while others are still shielding. The churches are both continuing with YouTube and phone-in services while also beginning to put on physical services. It's said that you can't please all the people all the time, but we're certainly trying our best in that regard!

What do we keep and what do we lose in the long term is a knotty problem that the PCCs, Benefice Council and Worship Leaders' Team needs to look at and come to some kind of a decision about over the next few months.

In order to help us as we discern the way forward we're putting out a questionnaire that is attached to this email asking everybody to reflect on this past 6 months and what should stay and what should go. Please do fill it in as the more responses we have the better understanding we will get of the feelings of the congregations as we move forwards.

Coming back to my desk also made me realise just how wonderful a team of people we have across the benefice and I would like to take this opportunity to thank a number of people, some by name, for the hard work they have put in over the last 6 months to help develop what we have done.
